

Permission to Wonder

Curiosity at Work:

Students are curious.... Students want "permission to wonder".... So, how can we put this to work in our classrooms?

- Observe objects that are unfamiliar & inspire questions. These can be related to a content area--For instance, you can use a math model or an illustration from a read aloud.
- Create a question parking lot space where students can share questions that they have about a topic of study.
- Use a template to allow students to record observations (provided).
- Wonder Wednesday: As morning work or a brain break provide a kid-friendly meme for kids to discuss or write about. This can be done in a classroom space either physically or virtually (using Google Classroom, or other system).
